Simulation modeling

The process of creating and analyzing a **digital version of the real world**, using existing data wherever possible.

Simulation modeling helps us safely test possible solutions to big public health problems.



The PROFOUND Model Simulates...

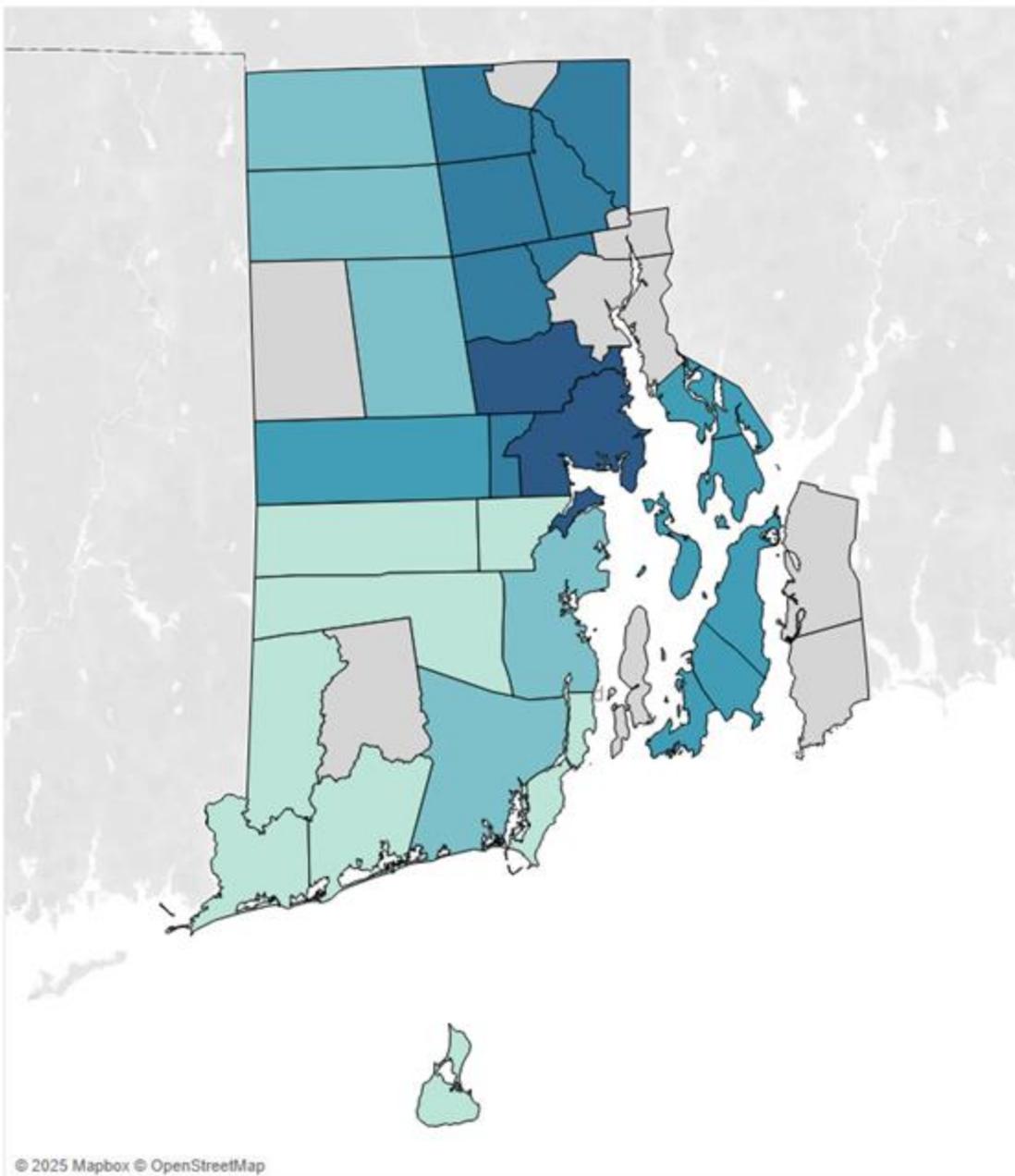
1. Rhode Islanders at risk for opioid overdose, broken down by:
 - Size of at-risk population in each city/town and overdose region
 - Drug use patterns/health states
 - Other characteristics that may affect overdose risk and naloxone access (e.g., age, sex)
2. In each 'month', whether a simulated person experiences an overdose.
3. What may happen during and after the overdose is determined by:
 - Was the overdose in public?
 - Was the overdose witnessed?
 - Was naloxone nearby, and if so, was it administered?

Next, we ask “what if” questions:

How could we distribute 5,000 naloxone kits during International Overdose Awareness Month (IOAD) to maximize impact and prevent overdose deaths?

- **Next Meeting:** September 17 at 10:30 a.m. at Rhode Island Communities for Addiction Recovery Efforts (RICARES), 66 Valley St., Ste. 105, Providence.
- Focuses on setting priorities, sharing information, and updating progress.

A Summary of the Past Year, Current Status, and Future Direction

**RHODE
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A Sample of Past Year Highlights

- The Department of Behavioral Healthcare, Developmental Disabilities & Hospitals (BHDDH) expanded funding for recovery advocacy and peer support work through RICARES, including developing guides and training for medication management.
- East Bay Community Action Program (EBCAP) opened a new recovery community center in Newport.
- Anchor Recovery began offering emergency department services in Westerly and moved their recovery community center from Warwick to West Warwick.
- The request for proposals to add recovery housing beds closed on August 18. Recovery housing policy shifted so that individuals who successfully completed treatment can enter recovery housing before 30 days, reducing the number entering recovery housing experiencing homelessness.

A Sample of Past Year Highlights



- Recovery-Friendly Workplace (RFW) improved their workplace certification process to include a baseline assessment, customized action plan, and quarterly workplace check-ins.
- C4 Innovations, Inc. has redesigned and implemented the 46-hour Certified Peer Recovery Specialist (CPRS) training, CPRS supervisor trainings, and advanced recovery ethics trainings.
- BHDDH and RICARES coordinated with C4 Innovations and their Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)-funded Program to Advance Recovery Knowledge (SPARK) Institute for a free employment training series from June through September 2025.

Current Aligning Initiatives

- Increase peer support in multiple settings.
 - Collegiate recovery programming
 - Association for Recovery in Higher Education (ARHE) is available for technical assistance.
 - Rhode Island College and the University of Rhode Island are in the funded pilot program.
 - Administrative Services Organization (ASO) for criminal justice-involved individuals or individuals enrolled in adult or family drug court needing treatment and/or recovery services.
 - Community Blessings Organization serving Newport County.
 - MMTherapy and Consulting, LLC serving Providence County.
- Increase employment opportunities for individuals with criminal records.
 - [OpenDoors](#) hosting job fairs.
 - [Building Futures](#) registered apprenticeship program.

Current and Future Work

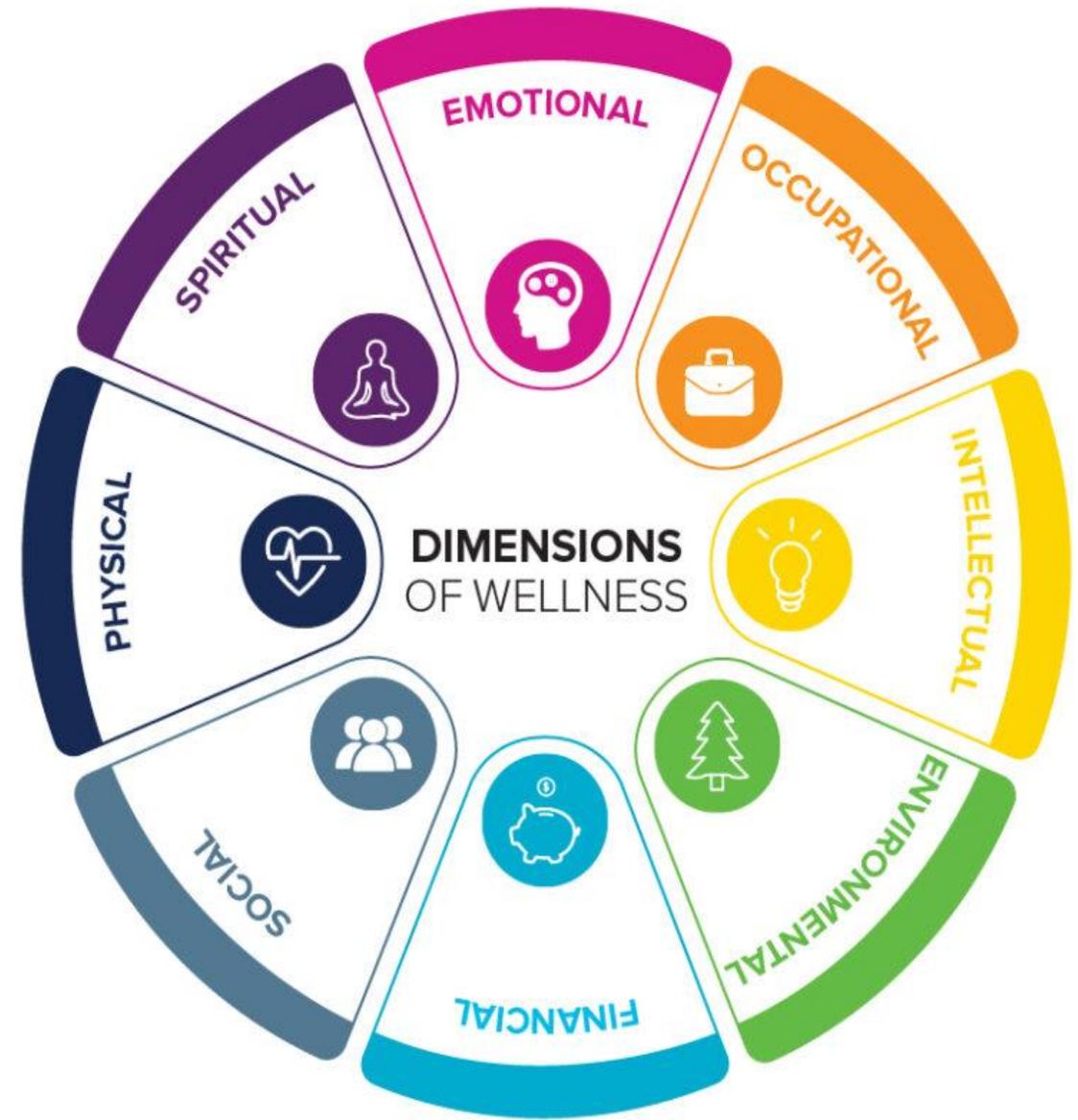
1) Measuring recovery capital throughout recovery programs for better outcomes tracking.

- Recovery- Oriented Measures Survey (ROMS) required for peer-based recovery supports.
- Recovery wellness/action plans required for recovery houses and recovery community center clients.

2) Establish the first National Alliance for Recovery Residences (NARR) Level IV recovery house option in Rhode Island.

3) Expand utilization of the ASO for individuals involved in the criminal justice system.

4) Reestablish paid peer internships that align with certification standards for the peer workforce.

What is a Recovery Residence

- Substance-free housing for individuals in recovery from addiction.
- All recovery residences center on peer support and recovery services.

RICARES is the Rhode Island NARR affiliate



The Social Model of Recovery



Experiential Knowledge

- Residents draw on their recovery experience to help others.
- Peer supporters giving and receiving help.

Sense of Community

- Feelings of connectedness and group membership.
- Mutual support and shared recovery goals.

Peer Support

- Residents are both supporters and supported.
- Building recovery capital together.

Levels of Support

The National Alliance of Recovery Residences (NARR) defines four levels of support, each with varying degrees of structure, supervision, and services.

Level 1 (Type P)

- Decisions made solely by residents
- No staff on site, owners serve as landlords

Level 2 (Type M)

- Compensated house manager
- Appointed house leader, set procedures

Level 3 (Type S)

- Weekly, structured programming
- Life skills development

Level 4 (Type C)

- Combines social and medical model
- Clinical and peer staff supervision

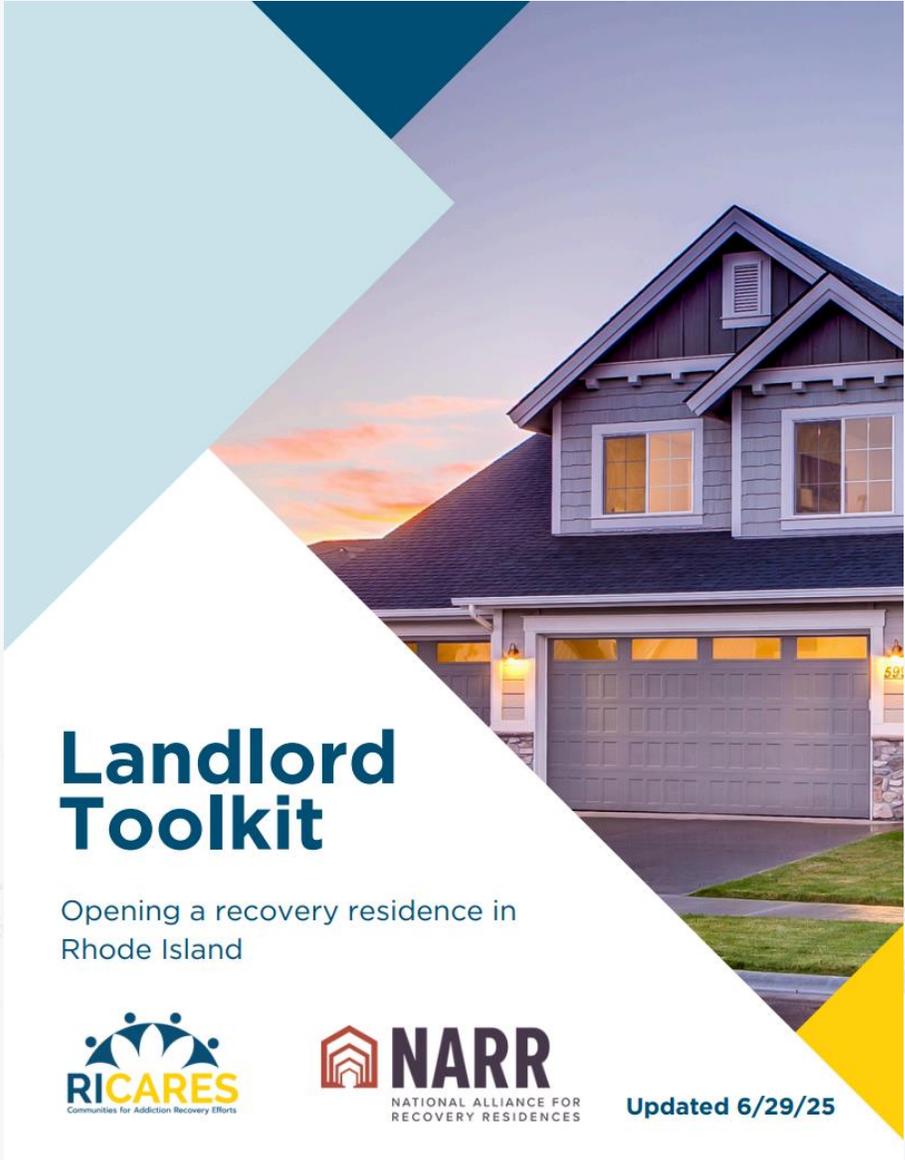

Why Certify?

- Required by Rhode Island Law 24277 for operating recovery residences.
- Enables referrals from State-funded entities.
- Ensures quality standards and resident safety.



Inspection



Physical Structure

- The house is sound and to code.
- Bedrooms and bathrooms meet specifications.
- Kitchen appliances work.

Safety/Security

- Naloxone readily available.
- Fire extinguishers included.
- Smoke/carbon monoxide detectors included.

Documentation

- Grievance policy posted.
- Contact list for organization.
- Emergency preparedness plan.

Certification

Certification

- Certification is good for two years.
- Recertification inspections are scheduled the month before your certification expires.
- Inspection takes between two to four hours.
